EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW BEFORE YOU LEAVE

ADMINISTRATIVE FORMALITIES

Information for French nationals, valid as of 01/01/2024 (check with embassy one month before departure for latest information).

Entering Indonesia: - Valid passport, valid for 6 months after your return - A one-month tourist visa is required. You can obtain this in 2 ways: either at the airport on arrival, or online before your departure. It costs around €29 and is not included in the price of this trip. 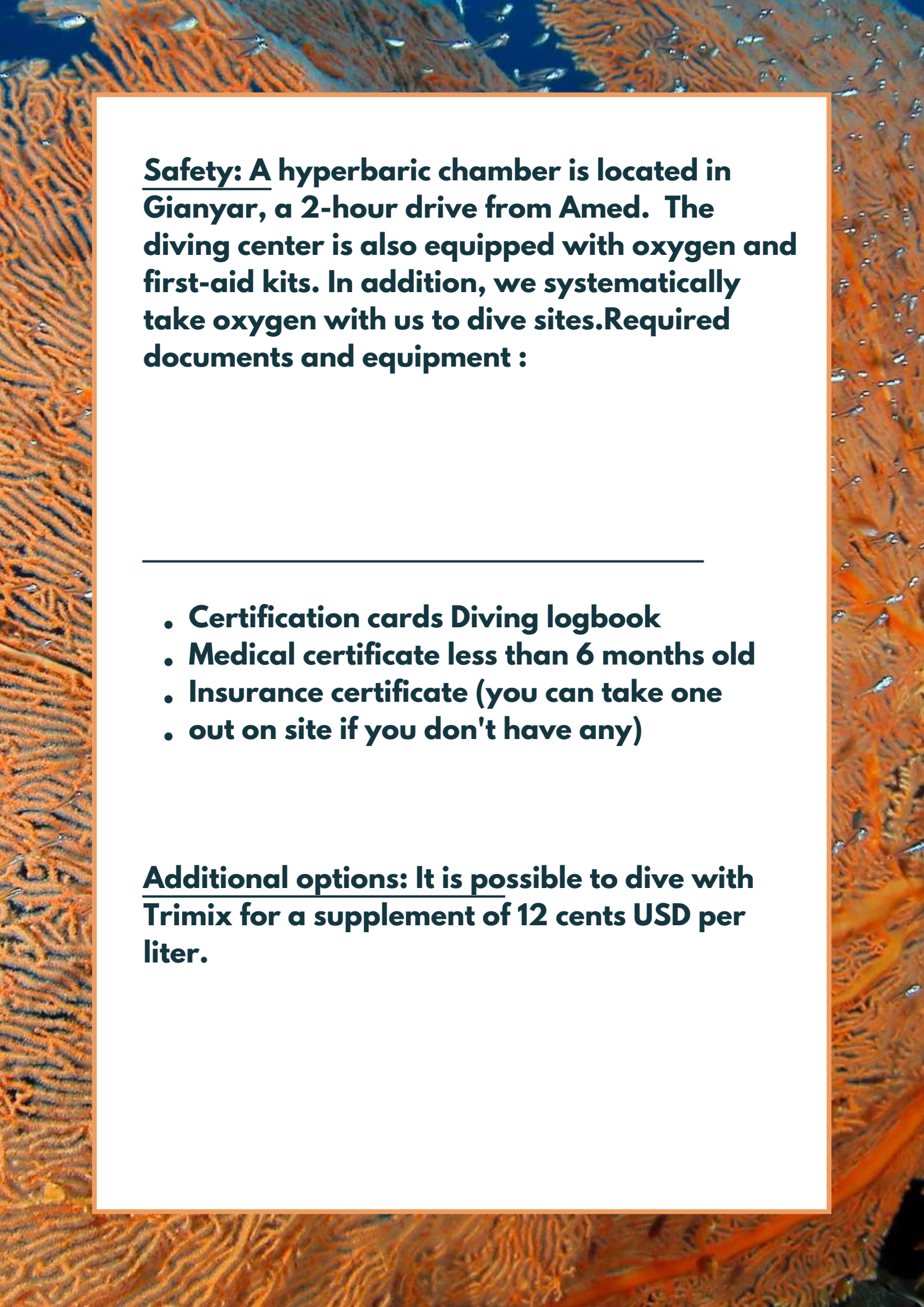

DIVING

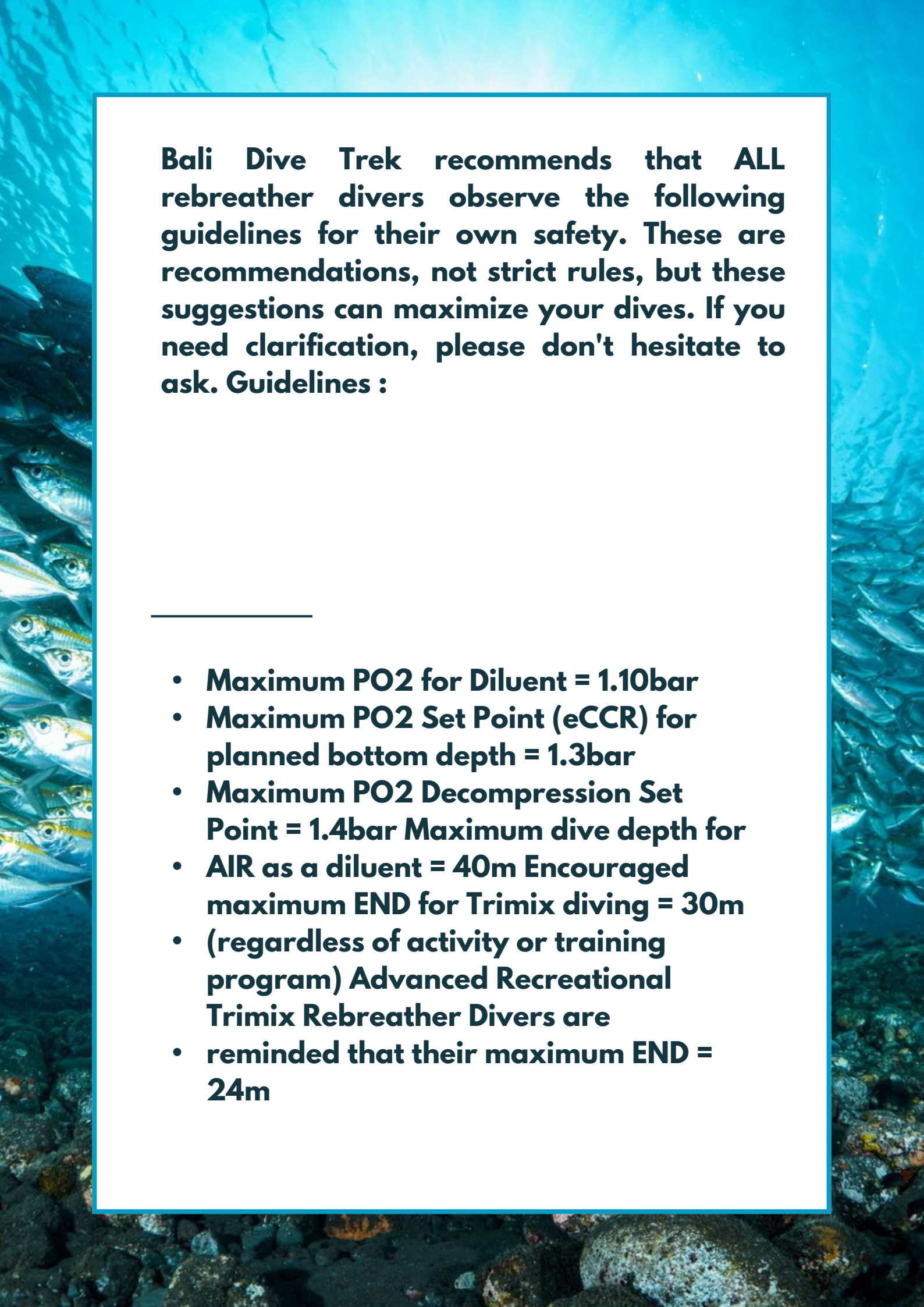
Supervision: A rebreather dive guide accompanies each dive, with a ratio of 3 divers per guide. Dive leadership is provided by a French director. **Participants :** Diving groups are made up of 3 to 10 divers. **Dives and levels required:** Dives can take place in strong, constant currents, especially on drift dives. The **minimum level** required is MOD 1, preferably with air decompression (up to 42 meters with 15 minutes decompression). You will participate in 14 dives over a 10-day period, generally between 8:00 and 15:00.



Safety: A hyperbaric chamber is located in Gianyar, a 2-hour drive from Amed. The diving center is also equipped with oxygen and first-aid kits. In addition, we systematically take oxygen with us to dive sites. Required documents and equipment :

- **Certification cards Diving logbook**
- **Medical certificate less than 6 months old**
- **Insurance certificate (you can take one out on site if you don't have any)**

Additional options: It is possible to dive with Trimix for a supplement of 12 cents USD per liter.

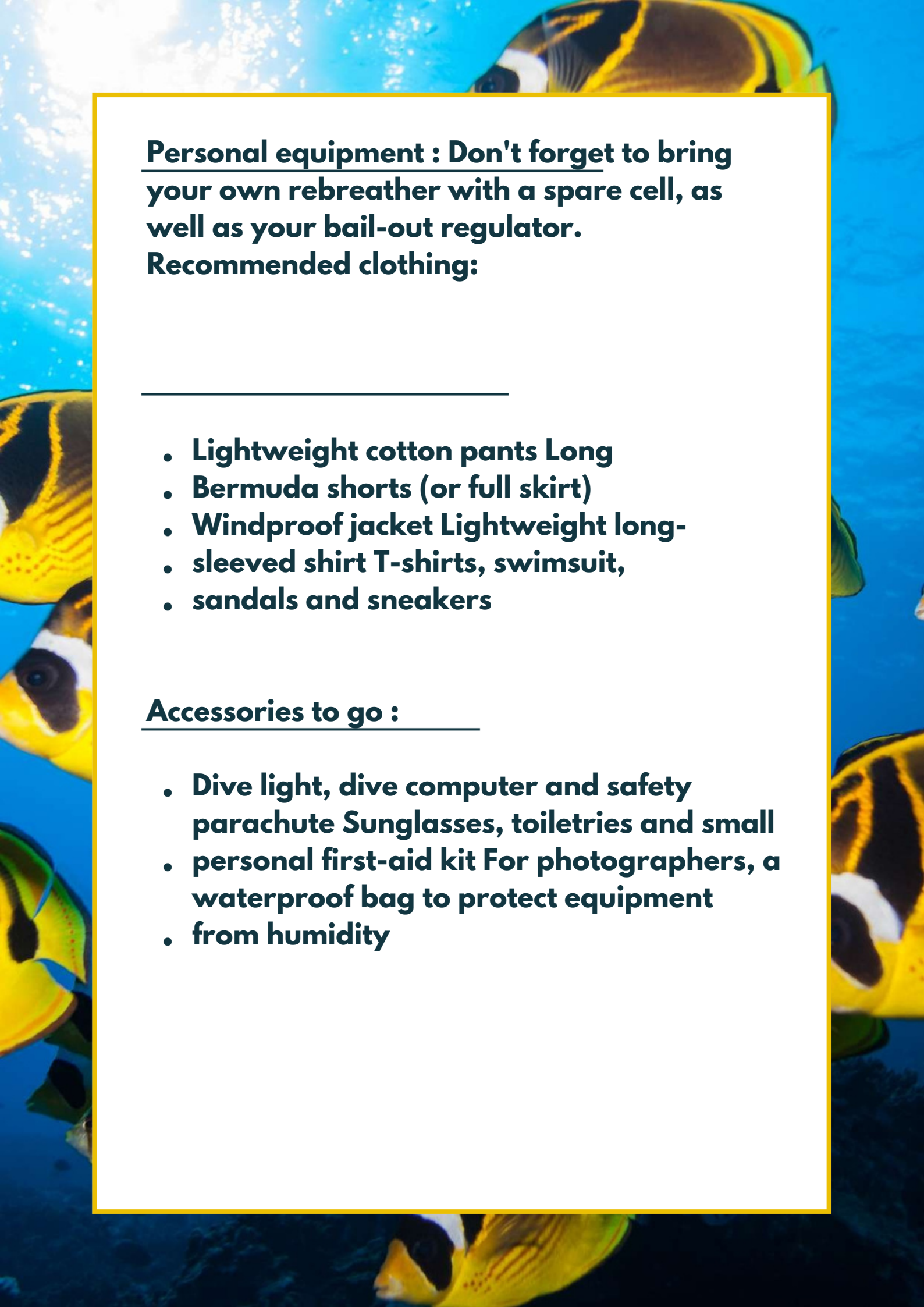


Bali Dive Trek recommends that ALL rebreather divers observe the following guidelines for their own safety. These are recommendations, not strict rules, but these suggestions can maximize your dives. If you need clarification, please don't hesitate to ask. Guidelines :

- **Maximum PO₂ for Diluent = 1.10bar**
- **Maximum PO₂ Set Point (eCCR) for planned bottom depth = 1.3bar**
- **Maximum PO₂ Decompression Set Point = 1.4bar Maximum dive depth for**
- **AIR as a diluent = 40m Encouraged maximum END for Trimix diving = 30m**
- **(regardless of activity or training program) Advanced Recreational Trimix Rebreather Divers are**
- **reminded that their maximum END = 24m**

STANDARD GASES:

TRIMIX: Tx 21/15 Tx 32/15 Tx 21/35 Tx 30/30 Tx 18/45 Tx 15/50 Tx 10/60 Equipment supplied: Rebreathers and bail-out regulators are not included. We offer 2 or 3-liter steel, aluminum or carbon cylinders, as well as 5.5-liter (S40 Alu) or 11.1-liter (S80 Alu) aluminum bail-outs, with their attachment kits. Nitrox at 32% is available for bail-outs, depending on the maximum planned depth (MOD based on a max PO2 of 1.6 bar).



Personal equipment : Don't forget to bring your own rebreather with a spare cell, as well as your bail-out regulator.

Recommended clothing:

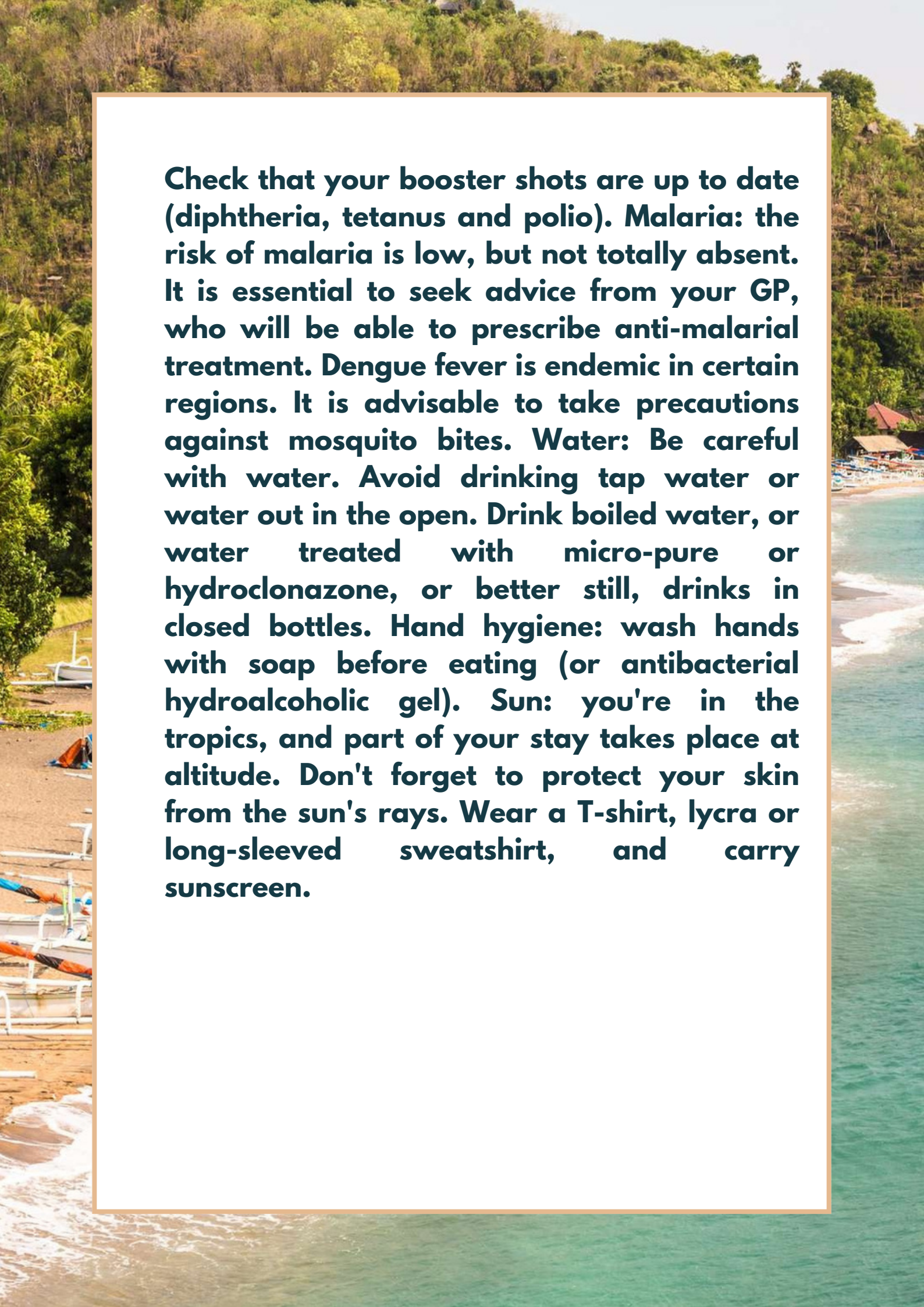
- **Lightweight cotton pants Long**

- **Windproof jacket Lightweight long-sleeved shirt T-shirts, swimsuit,**
- **sandals and sneakers**

Accessories to go :

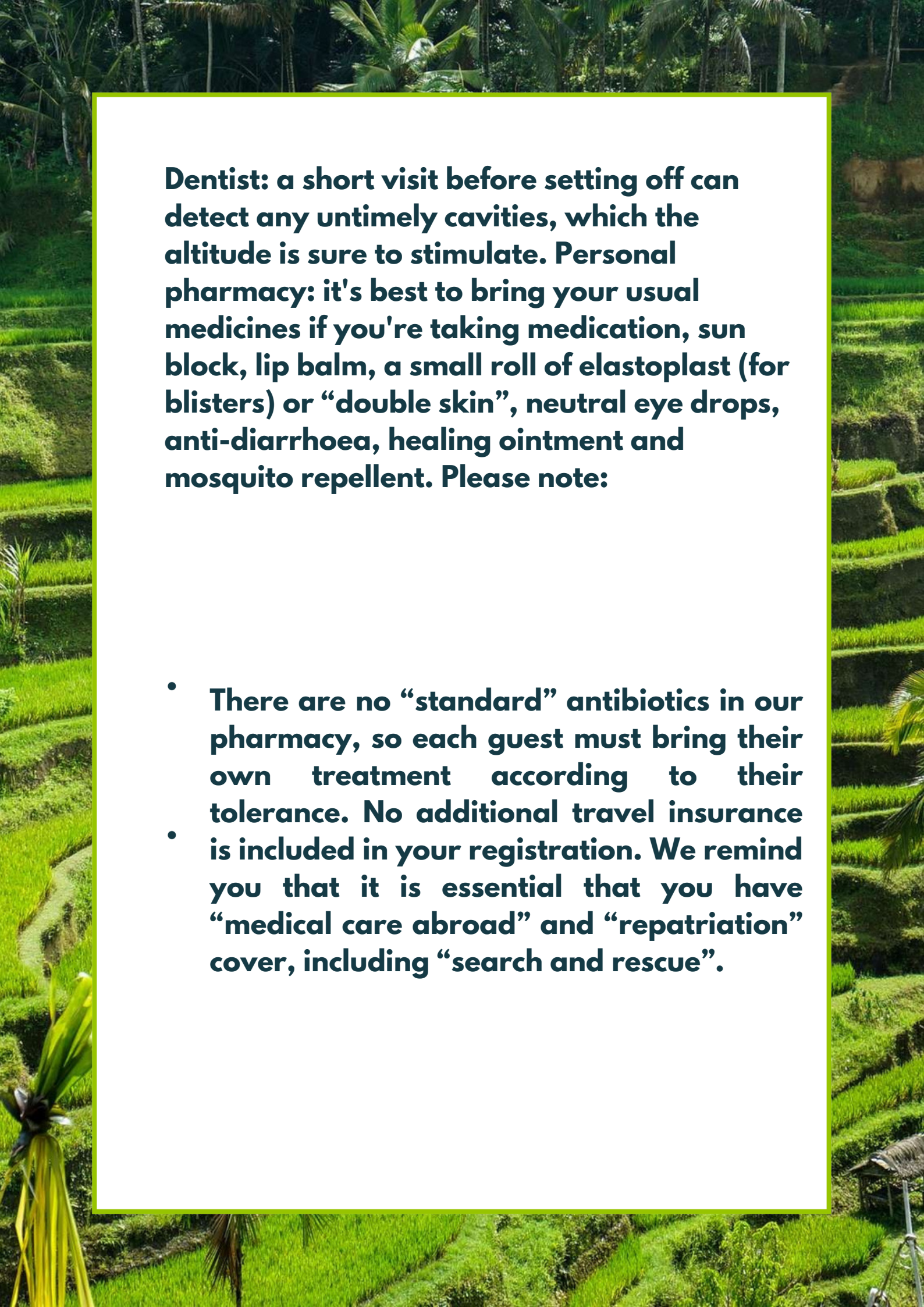
- **Dive light, dive computer and safety parachute Sunglasses, toiletries and small**
- **personal first-aid kit For photographers, a waterproof bag to protect equipment**
- **from humidity**

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Weather: Hot and heavy during the wet season (December to June), drier the rest of the year. During the wet season, rain falls in short showers at the end of the day. Altitude plays a crucial role in temperature variations, ranging from Bali's typical tropical climate (as in Amed and along the coast) to a temperate climate in high-altitude areas around volcanoes, such as Mount Batur, Mount Agung and Besakih. Average min/max temperatures: Amed and rest of coast: 38°/28° Highlands: 12°/25° Health information: Vaccinations: No vaccinations are required by the Indonesian authorities. However, anti-tetanus and typhoid vaccinations, as well as hepatitis A and B, are strongly recommended.

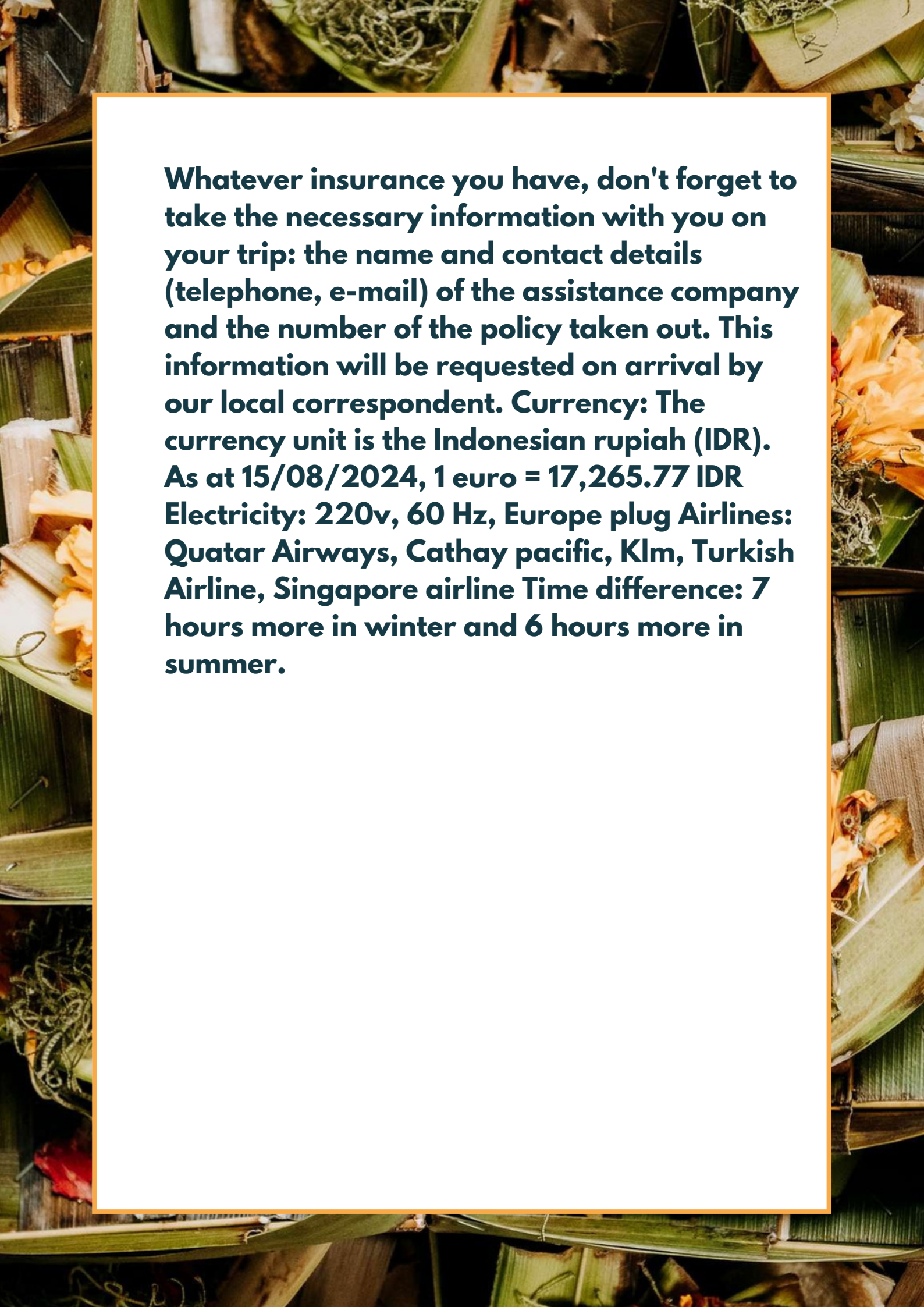


Check that your booster shots are up to date (diphtheria, tetanus and polio). Malaria: the risk of malaria is low, but not totally absent. It is essential to seek advice from your GP, who will be able to prescribe anti-malarial treatment. Dengue fever is endemic in certain regions. It is advisable to take precautions against mosquito bites. Water: Be careful with water. Avoid drinking tap water or water out in the open. Drink boiled water, or water treated with micro-pure or hydroclonazone, or better still, drinks in closed bottles. Hand hygiene: wash hands with soap before eating (or antibacterial hydroalcoholic gel). Sun: you're in the tropics, and part of your stay takes place at altitude. Don't forget to protect your skin from the sun's rays. Wear a T-shirt, lycra or long-sleeved sweatshirt, and carry sunscreen.

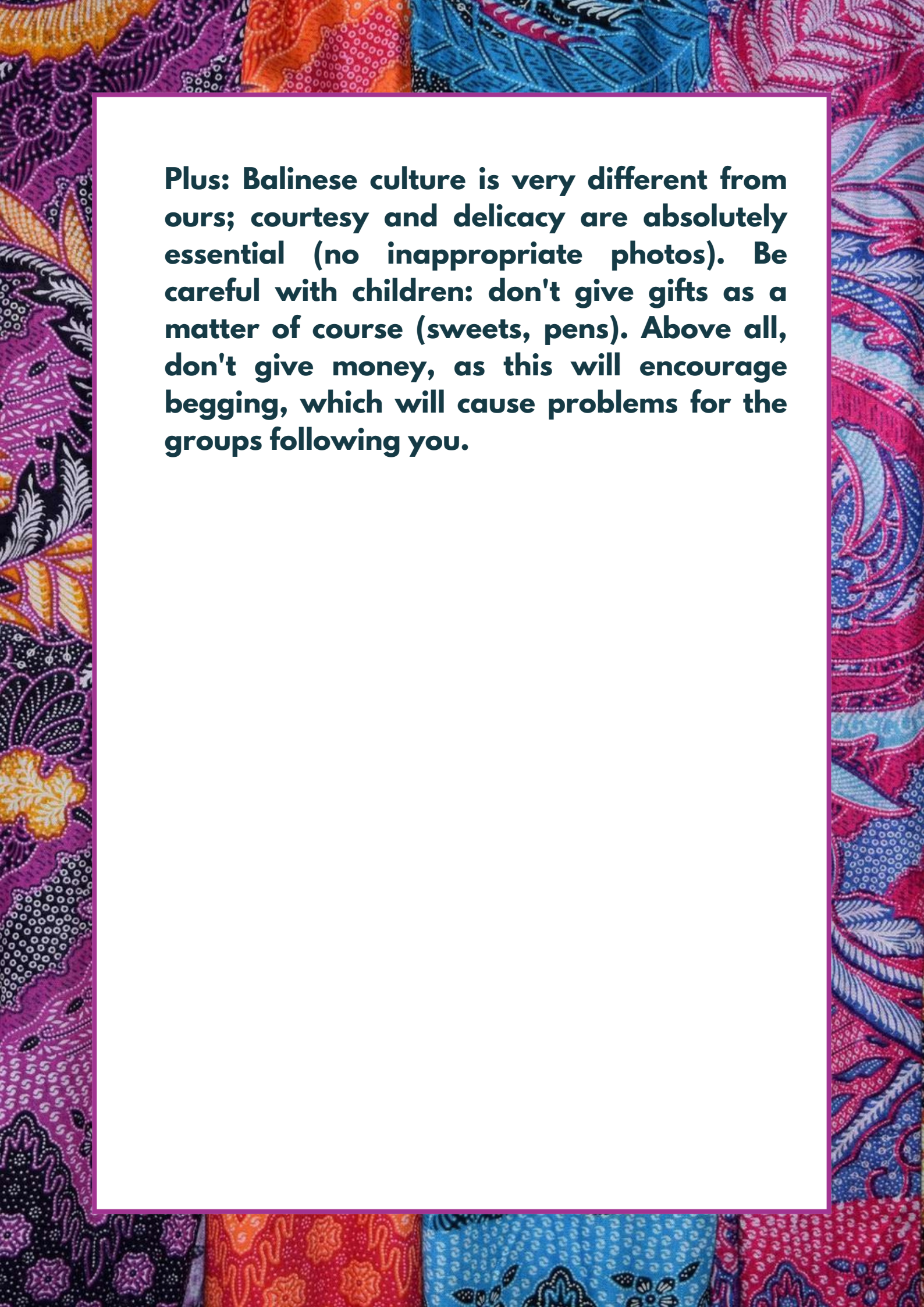


Dentist: a short visit before setting off can detect any untimely cavities, which the altitude is sure to stimulate. Personal pharmacy: it's best to bring your usual medicines if you're taking medication, sun block, lip balm, a small roll of elastoplast (for blisters) or “double skin”, neutral eye drops, anti-diarrhoea, healing ointment and mosquito repellent. Please note:

- **There are no “standard” antibiotics in our pharmacy, so each guest must bring their own treatment according to their tolerance. No additional travel insurance**
- **is included in your registration. We remind you that it is essential that you have “medical care abroad” and “repatriation” cover, including “search and rescue”.**



Whatever insurance you have, don't forget to take the necessary information with you on your trip: the name and contact details (telephone, e-mail) of the assistance company and the number of the policy taken out. This information will be requested on arrival by our local correspondent. Currency: The currency unit is the Indonesian rupiah (IDR). As at 15/08/2024, 1 euro = 17,265.77 IDR Electricity: 220v, 60 Hz, Europe plug Airlines: Qatar Airways, Cathay pacific, Klm, Turkish Airline, Singapore airline Time difference: 7 hours more in winter and 6 hours more in summer.



Plus: Balinese culture is very different from ours; courtesy and delicacy are absolutely essential (no inappropriate photos). Be careful with children: don't give gifts as a matter of course (sweets, pens). Above all, don't give money, as this will encourage begging, which will cause problems for the groups following you.
